### **A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR**

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I am starting a new thing as I select texts to preach from. We have been through two cycles of the lectionary since I started as your pastor. For those of you who don't know what the lectionary is, back in 1969 the Catholic Church put together a set of readings from the bible that covered worship for every Sunday and every holy day for three years. Since then revisions to that original document have been made by various Protestant traditions. The latest revision that has gained common acceptance is the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). Publicly released in 1994, the RCL is used by Catholic churches, Episcopal churches, Lutheran churches, Anglican churches, Presbyterian churches, and Methodist churches. The three year cycle is broken into years A, B, and C. The church year does not coincide with the calendar year. The first Sunday of a church year is the first Sunday of Advent, usually the end of November or the beginning of December. The last Sunday of a church year is Christ the King Sunday, sometimes called "The Reign of Christ" Sunday.

Each Sunday the RCL indicates an Old Testament text, a psalm, a gospel text, and an excerpt from an epistle. I will choose from any of those texts to preach on for any given Sunday. Sometimes I will feel called to preach on a text that I had already preached on three, or six years ago. But I typically avoid doing that. Sometimes (not often) I have a hard time selecting a scripture text for a given Sunday. In those cases, with a little more prayer, I will eventually find the passage meant for that day and everything usually works out.

But I wonder if one day I will be called to preach from a scripture passage that is not indicated by the RCL. The regimen that I have employed for the last eight years would have caused us to miss an opportunity. I think that would be unfortunate.

### **A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR**

So I have begun examining texts in the New Testament that are not included in the RCL. September 30 will be the first Sunday where I will be using a scripture passage that is not in the lectionary. This passage is about the birth of John the Baptist. For the holy days of the church like Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, Baptism of the Lord, etc. I will likely continue to use the lectionary texts. But for Sundays in "Ordinary Time" I will begin looking for fresh ground for us to explore. I hope you share my excitement in the potential to learn more about what's in the Bible and how less-traveled ground can enrich our spiritual lives.

On a personal note, I will be getting my right hip replaced on November 27. As a result I will not be leading worship on December 2nd. An old friend from seminary, Rev. Carl Parsons, who retired recently, will come and lead us in worship. If I do as well in recovery as I did for my left hip, I may be joining you in worship that day.

Lastly, I'd like to make you aware of the numerous prayer concerns we have. Among them are: LaNae Grimes, who is in a rehab center in Raleigh struggling with an infection; Bev Hummel, who is at UNC Hospital recovering from some extremely invasive surgery on her lower jaw; Ellen Burnett, who is having some serious problems with her eyes; and Sally Ray Warren, who continues to struggle to be the lovely and jovial person we know her to be. Of course there are the multitudes who are recovering from the hurricane. All could use our prayers. Also, some could use some good old-fashioned loving in the form of visits and possibly a cooked meal. May God bless us all as we discern ways to help those who need help.

## FINANCIAL UPDATE:

Hello congregation, we have finalized our church financials through August and I have to say that the August pledged income was really an improvement – we were under budget by only \$360! Thanks for the wonderful response since the last newsletter. Unfortunately, even with the very good August our year to date pledged income is still \$6,620 under budget. The Finance and Personnel Committee's request now is that each member **ensure that you are current for the year with your pledged giving** commitment. By the way, surpassing your pledged amount is quite acceptable.

Additionally, we have other sources of income besides pledges. These include non-pledged giving, loose offerings, preschool contributions, and facility usage with all but non-pledges being close to budget. The non-pledged income is \$4,790 under budget. This non-pledged income amount is based on previous years of giving without an associated pledge card and it has been, as you can imagine, quite variable.

Overall, the church's income is \$10,492 under budget through August. Expenditures are close to budget so we are currently in about a \$10,000 negative situation. Expenditures should track on target by year-end so our focus as a church will be to meet our budgeted income.

For 2019, Consecration Sunday is coming soon, so our committee requests that your pledged amount reflects your commitment to meet your 2019 pledge.

Our committee would love to have additional members who are willing to serve on this very important committee to enhance our mission in the church and in our community. If interested, please let me know. The next meeting is October 11<sup>th</sup> at 6PM in the Parlor.
