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A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Monday January 21st was the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Day of Service. In 1994 Congress acted to make the third Monday of January a national day calling all Americans to work together to solve the nation's problems. The idea was that this would move America closer to Dr. King's vision of a "Beloved Community."

In light of our current national political climate that all seems like a pipe dream, an unobtainable goal conceived by dreamers that have their heads in the clouds. It makes one wonder if our nation is on a trajectory towards a permanent state of rancor and intransigence, or an outright breakup into ideological enclaves.

I remember attending a class in seminary that was taught by an excellent professor who was at one time the president of Davidson College. His name is John Kuykendall. He was a professor of religion and would keep us in wrapt attention for hours with just a couple index cards for notes. The subject of the class was Religion in the South. During one lecture on the Civil Rights Movement, Dr. Kuykendall made the comment that sometime between 1967 and 1968 racist language stopped being part of polite conversation.

That is something to wonder about given the amount of violence that attended the struggle for civil rights in that same time period. The Civil Rights Act was enacted in 1964. But things were far from settled then. If anything the aggression against black people continued but possibly in less public ways. So what was responsible for this shift in social dialog?

This is more of a sociological question, which means the exact answer may never be known. But if I may, I would like to offer a possible answer. The forces of racism and hatred had a countervailing force: the force of neighborliness. By neighborliness I mean that one cannot long live alongside someone who is different than you without naturally learning more about that person. With that knowledge comes familiarity. With familiarity comes fraternity, or a sense of being "we" rather than "you" and "I." With fraternity comes fidelity, charity, and kindness. With fidelity, charity, and kindness comes love. This graduation into a closer and closer relationship just naturally happens. We are built to form those bonds by our Creator.

This means that those forces that want to hate, alienate, and estrange others exist in an alternate social order that was artificially produced by humankind. It goes against our natural tendencies to form relationships and build communities. Compared to the truth of God's creative purpose, those forces that want to separate us are lies and falsehoods. We can no more deny our neighborly nature than we can deny the radiance of the sun.

So to those who worry about the current divisive state of American society, I would say this. Don't. We have weathered worse and seen the better aspects of humanity prevail. This illness that plagues our society is just that, a momentary, feverish condition that will pass after it runs its course. As Psalm 139 says, we are fearfully and wonderfully made. Praise God for the way that he made us! *Peace, Joe*
