A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This past Sunday night I watched the movie production of West Side Story. This is the movie that was made in 1961 with Richard Beymer and Natalie Wood in the lead roles. I have watched it before, maybe more than once.

In the past I remember seeing the animosity between the two rival gangs. I remember hearing the racial slurs and the words of hatred and thinking, "Wow, I am glad those times are behind us." But in my latest viewing of this movie what struck me is how this type of speech has found its way back into our culture. The issue of strife between ethnicities in our country has sadly become a contemporary problem. Some would say that it has always been a problem, but it is once again finding an opportunity for expression.

I guess I have always been sensitive to ethnic hatred, even though I have never been the target of it. My father is from El Salvador he came with his family to this country as a boy. He does not speak with a Spanish accent despite being raised in a Spanish-speaking household. My mother is from Pennsylvania with German and Irish ancestry. My father never spoke Spanish to me or my brothers. My father's mother, whom I called Mama Luchy, would occasionally speak Spanish while speaking to my father, but would refuse to speak Spanish in public. I remember her talking to a woman at a Spanish bakery in Rockville, Maryland where she lived. The woman knew her and started speaking Spanish. My grandmother objected saying, "We live in America, let's speak English."

Nowadays there is more of a cosmopolitan culture in America. Knowing a foreign language is valued among people who will likely never have to speak in anything other than their native tongue of English. I remember when I was writing software for a pharmacy software company I was in charge of making sure the language on pill bottle labels could be easily switched to Spanish. One time when I was training a pharmacist in Chicago to use our software, I showed that feature to her. Her response was, "that makes me so mad." I was puzzled until she explained that her

father and mother were from Poland. They worked hard to learn English as a second language. Seeing that the Hispanic community was accommodated while her father still struggled with English was hard for her to accept. Granted hers was not a charitable position towards Latinos, but I have no doubt that it was sincerely felt and born out of a belief that the rules have unfairly changed since previous generations of immigrants came to this country.

It is with this understanding that I view our current social climate towards immigrants. Contained within the animus, is bigotry and prejudice, but also a sense that things are changing in a way that is much different from the status quo thirty, or more, years ago. My guestion is how do we get American society to back down from this surly feeling towards people who are different from us? The Old Testament points us toward a compassionate regard for the "aliens dwelling among you." The gospel of Jesus Christ calls us to make no distinction among ethnicities as we all share in the call to grow in relationship with God. How do we assure each other that diversity is to be embraced and not feared? How do we remind ourselves that our common American identity is not in having a common language or skin color, but is in the common belief in the ideals of liberty and justice? How do we get to a place where we feel proud that so many wish to come to America? How do we become charitable to those who come needing so much and look at them as an investment in our future? America was a country born out of a sense of love for fellow human beings. That sense comes from a profound Christian heritage in this country. In my mind that is a heritage worth restoring and making it manifest in the ideals that once made this country great and can make it great yet again.
