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A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I remember when I was entering high school my father asked me if there were any causes for which I would get out and get involved. The idea sounded strange to me. I had grown up hearing about starving children in other parts of the world. But I still thought of myself as a young person and incapable of doing much of anything except collecting change for UNICEF at Halloween. Besides, those problems seemed so far away. I wondered if they were better solved by people who were closer to them.

Since that time, I have learned a few things. I now know that, even though I may live far away, I can still help. I do not have to experience poverty to help out impoverished people.

The prophet Isaiah, a man speaking primarily to men in his writings, proclaimed that God's expectation was for the people of Israel to take care of widows and orphans. Jesus, who was not a Samaritan, showed through his own actions and through his parables that God expects us take care of those who are different from us. The point is that when someone else is in need, I should empathetically feel that need, or at least be aware of it, and strive to help that situation in one way or another.

The difficulty in taking this compassionate stance is that very often those who get involved, but don't have a "dog in the fight," are viewed with suspicion. Since they don't have the experiences which would naturally make an advocate for a person or people, their devotion to that person or persons can be questioned. This suspicion doesn't come from nowhere. It is born out of experiences with people who come to help but, for one reason or another, don't finish the work they have started. Or they come to help but refuse to listen and understand the real needs of people in need, the assumption being that the person or persons helping know better what those who need help truly need. This attitude is called "paternalism."

Paternalism can take on many forms. Sometimes it is in the form of laws that prohibit actions and the creation of products that can be harmful to people. Motorcycle helmet laws and, more recently, laws against e-cigarettes are examples. These laws have good intentions but (maybe necessarily) limit people's liberties.

Other times paternalism can take the form of forced cultural assimilation. In the early to mid-twentieth century, native American children were taken from their homes, put in schools

with white children, and told never to speak their native language. The assumption was that cultural assimilation would address the woes of alcoholism and poverty that afflicted native people after being relocated from their ancestral homes. Now it is understood that forced assimilation has done nothing to address the problems of alcoholism and poverty in the native American population and instead created another problem with alienation among generations and near cultural extinction amongst many native Americans.

In Africa, paternalism can be seen in the shocking failure rate among hand pumps for water in rural areas that are installed by charitable organizations. A United Nations Joint Monitoring Program of watering points in Africa reveal a failure rate of between 30% and 60%. What is the reason for this?

The Voss Foundation, an organization that has been working on Africa's water problem for years, says that the situation is almost always the same. A Non-governmental organization (NGO) arrives, digs a well, installs a hand pump, and leaves. There was no attempt to train the community in maintenance. The NGO never returned after the pump was installed. And the NGO left no way to get in touch with them for support with broken hand pumps.

It is for this reason that I am pleased that our congregation has chosen to support clean water solutions for Africa which involve partnerships with native communities and implement sustainable solutions like water-filtering kits which have support infrastructures attached to them.

As Christians we are called to help others in need. But part of helping is listening and not forcing the people we help to live in ways that are unsustainable or unnatural to them. This requires more effort in coming up with truly helpful solutions to problems, but the reward is that paternalism is kept to a minimum, we show ourselves to be trustworthy partners, and community grows among people in distant parts of the world.

Thanks to everyone for donating! Clean water gives life!





Mental Health First Aid USA for Older Adults and Those Dealing with

Later-Life Issues is an 8 hour public education program which introduces participants to the unique risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems in adults and older adults, builds understanding of the importance of early intervention, and teaches individuals how to help an adult/older adult in crisis or experiencing a mental health challenge.

Mental Health First Aid uses role-playing and simulations to demonstrate how to assess a mental health crisis; select interventions and provide initial help; and connect people to professional, peer, social, and self-help care.

What Will Participants Learn? The course teaches participants the risk factors and warning signs of a variety of mental health challenges common among older adults, including dementia, anxiety, depression, psychosis, and substance use disorder. Participants do not learn to diagnose, nor how to provide any therapy or counseling – rather, participants learn to support an adult developing signs and symptoms of a mental illness or in an emotional crisis by applying a core five-step action plan:

- Assess for risk of suicide or harm
- Listen nonjudgmentally
- Give reassurance and information
- Encourage appropriate professional help
- Encourage self-help and other support strategies


