## **A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR**

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I have a number of things to talk to you about this month. First some sad news. Charles Harris has decided that he is not able to return to be our organist. He has been steadily improving in his cognitive abilities, but he is still not able to drive. His doctor tells him that if he ever gets to the point where he can live independently again it will be years in coming. He recognized that it is not practical for us to keep his position open for him that long.

Already I have heard from some who want to celebrate Charles' service to the church. I certainly think that is a good idea. If you have some thoughts on how to do that, please share them with me.

In the meantime I have charged the Worship committee with discerning next steps. Again, please contact me if you have some thoughts about what those next steps should be.

Next I would like to tell you that the session, after receiving a recommendation from the Worship and Finance & Personnel Committees, has granted me some extended time off after Christmas. I asked for this to help me complete my doctoral thesis. I will be gone from December 25 to February 3. Wally Spragins has very generously volunteered to preach for me each of the Sundays I will be away. I will return momentarily to conduct the service of installation of new elders on January 12 and serve communion on that day. Also, should any emergent situation arise I will come back to work to do whatever needs to be done.

I am very thankful to the church's leadership for granting me this. Without it I doubt that I would be able to complete my thesis on time. This is partially because I have been finding it very difficult to devote time toward my thesis while I am doing the work of the church. Ordinarily I would use study leave to do this sort of thing. I am normally given two weeks of study leave per year. This year I asked to bank one of those weeks for next year in order to help me devote a long stretch of time to my thesis and also defray the expense of asking for this extra time off.

The remaining twelve days are a gift from session and Wally Spragins, to whom I am also very thankful for lending his considerable skills as a worship leader and preacher to the church at no expense.

The last thing I want to share with you is something I have discovered as I was planning the joint service with First United Methodist Church. Rev. Joe Casteel, the pastor at FUMC, and I have been enjoying lunch together every two weeks or so since this summer. In that time we have talked about a good many things concerning being a pastor. One thing we didn't talk much about was our denomination's respective theologies. I think we both consciously avoided that topic for fear that we would get into some heated dogmatic discussion.

But one time at lunch I decided that I would ask for the title of a book that would help me better understand Methodist theology. Rev. Joe gave me a title and what I have read has challenged me and at the same time made me realize that our denominations are not so far apart theologically. For the present, I need to do some more reading, but sometime in the future look for some learning opportunities that involve finding out what our Methodist brothers and sisters believe.




