A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Nancy and I are in West Virginia where I used to live and work and go to school. My mother and stepfather still live here, a lot of my friends still live here. My brothers came here to celebrate Christmas with my mother and stepfather. For the first time in several years we have all been at the same place for Christmas. It has been a nice steady dose of reunions for the past several days. Nancy and I even sang in the church choir in worship at the Methodist church where I used to be a member. Lots of fun.

My mother and stepfather live on a large tract of hilly land they bought when our family moved to West Virginia in 1979. The hills are so steep that they are in your face as you climb them.

I urged my brothers to go walking on the property like we used to do when we were putting up barbwire fence, hauling firewood and clearing briar patches. Hard work was part of our day when we lived there. Even so, as our elderly neighbors would remind us at the time, we had it easy. They used to plant gardens on those hills for food. The firewood they would gather was for heat and for cooking. And the fences they would build would have to contain strong bulls, not docile horses.

But even as our experiences of living in the hills of West Virginia were different, our appreciation for living where we did was the same. The older people of the hills and I could both agree that it was a fine life to have a place that you could call your own, no matter how hilly and inhospitable, and enjoy the benefits of your own hard labor.

That kind of life is enjoyable, but in those years I came to know something else. Hard manual labor has its own joys. The joys come from discovering what you are capable of and gaining a certain level of mastery over your environs. During college on my summer break I would work as a hand on a neighbor's property clearing land and splitting firewood for sale. I didn't get paid until October or November when the firewood was being sold. But I kept coming back to work each summer because I found the

work suited me and I was good at it. I had a role in life which included using my body to lift, carry, build, and mend things. Now as some of my joints have been replaced and I have to be careful about what I lift, I realize that my role in life is not what it used to be. The work I am called to is less and less about manual labor and more and more about thinking.

As my vacation is drawing to a close I am approaching the time you have given to me to work on my thesis. This time will be filled with hard work of a kind that I believe will represent what my role will be in my future. But I hope that it will present its own joys.

I covet your prayers as I prepare to undergo this hard work. God bless. I will see you again on February 3.

A MESSAGE FROM THE FINANCE COMMITTEE		
As we enter into a new year, the Session-approved 2020 budget is printed below for your review. We are pleased that so many of the commitments we make to further the work of Christ in our community and in the world will continue to be strong. The F&P Committee would like to thank each of you for your response in submitting solid pledges for the year – and, as you know, the income from the pledges and other giving provides for our expenditures.		
As stated at the congregational meeting on December 1, our income for 2020 is about \$5,400 less than 2019, even though pledges were almost \$3,000 above 2019 (some non-pledge income moved to actual pledge commitments). As we result of the lower income, expenditures have been reduced to balance the budget. The actions taken were to reduce the F&P budget by about \$3,000, Facilities by \$1,250, Witness by \$750, and Worship by \$400. Although the income may be down slightly, we know that each of you will continue to not only match or exceed your pledge, but also contribute with Special Offerings throughout the year.
