A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear brother and sisters in Christ,

I have some updates to share with you concerning the church buildings. The Facilities Committee, with the session in accord, has decided to put a new roof on the Loy Building in addition to the sanctuary and the Walker Building. This decision came as the Loy Building Roof was showing the same wear as the Walker Building. Our contractor, Hernandez Roofing Company, is able to continue their presence with us and will start work on the Loy Building soon. The money we received from our insurance company should pay for this additional project.

Currently, the sanctuary roof lacks two things before it can be considered complete. There is a metal cover being fabricated to cover the short flue pipe sticking out of the roof where the tall chimney used to be. When that is complete there will be some cleanup done on the interior of the church in an organ pipe chamber and then the pipes that had been taken out will be replaced.

The other thing that the sanctuary needs is a thing called a cricket. A cricket is a sloped area that will fill in the space behind the tower so the rainwater will go around the tower rather than pool behind it and leak. I have made a rough drawing of it below to help you visualize it. The cricket's outline is in red. It should barely be visible from the street. The Walker Building and the Loy Building by comparison don't have the same complex architecture and are much more straightforward to roof.

It is Tuesday, February 27 as I write this. In three days we will be entering the month of March and by the end of that month we will have already celebrated Easter. I don't say this to scare you, just to tell you to be prepared. Easter is of course a pivotal holiday, or Holy Day, for Christians. We can enter into Lent with the impression that Easter is still a ways off, but this year Easter is early. But why does the day that Easter is celebrated fluctuate?

Easter is scheduled as the first Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox. An equinox is an event that occurs two times a year where the number of minutes of daylight equal the number of minutes of nighttime. The spring equinox is when the number of minutes of daylight is poised to become greater than the number of minutes of nighttime.

Now you may be thinking, why didn't the church choose to celebrate Easter on a set date like it did for Christmas? The reason is that the church wanted to celebrate Easter three days after the beginning of the Jewish feast of Passover which is when scripture tells us that Jesus was crucified.

Passover is an old holy day that long predates the calendar that we use today. Hebrews used a lunisolar calendar which takes into account both the lunar and solar calendars. Scripture tells us that Passover is to be celebrated on the 14th day of Nisan. Nisan is the first month of spring in the northern hemisphere. The 14th day corresponds to a full moon. Full moons can happen on any day of the week. The church decided to celebrate Easter only on Sunday. So the calculation of when Easter is celebrated doesn't adhere to the Hebrew calendar or satisfy our desire to celebrate holy days on the same date each year. Celebrating Easter means being ready - a theme we hear from Jesus quite often.

International Women's Day

March 8 is International Women's Day as declared by the United Nations. In an ongoing effort to : 1) acknowledge the myriad of contributions and accomplishments of women locally, women beside you in the pew, and around the world,; 2) as well as consciousness raising of the ongoing discrimination and devaluation of women in the world the Presbyterian church has dedicated the Sunday closest to March 8 as "CELEBRATE THE GIFTS OF WOMEN" Sunday.

As we are examining our appreciation for the ultimate sacrifice that Jesus made for us this Lenten season please pause and remember prayerfully, the many acts of love and kindness as well as sacrifices our mothers sisters, daughters and women have made for

us. Remember that Jesus calls each of us to value the role of EACH person (regardless of gender or station in life) in the community of faith.

Presbyterian Women are studying women's encounters with Jesus. In the first four gospels let us look at the differing responses of Martha and Mary to Jesus' visit. One thing is at least implied that they both loved Jesus and were choosing to serve him in any way a woman of that time and culture was allowed. Mary sat at Jesus' feet and absorbed Jesus' teaching (a position culturally at the time only for men) and Martha focused on chores and hospitality at this time. While they both had differing responses to Jesus' visit they celebrated God's gift of Jesus sent for our salvation.

In John 11:27 after her brother Lazarus died Martha is said to have made a profession of faith to Jesus, "Yes Lord I believe you are the Messiah, the son of God, the one coming into the world. "Like in todays time of looking at the varying contributions of not only women, but every person, the four gospels treat Mary and Martha with different perspectives.

As Dr. Olive Mahabir writes in summary, "Re-imagining Martha's role in the Jesus movement and acknowledging Mary's role as Christ-given allows us to reaffirm the doctrine of the priesthood of all believers for our reformed churches today. The priesthood of all believers dismantles the notion of hierarchy and selectivity in the church, and affirms that each person has access to God and God's word. ... a church to one which everyone feels valued and everyone has a part in mission of Christ."

...and let all the people say BLESSINGS and Amen!

Witherson Committee New Like the early postal service "not rain , snow (some of us wish), extreme cold or dead of night shall keep us from our appointed mission. The FPC Book Bag Buddies were on time to help feed hungry children over the weekends in January and February. Dedicated church members continue to shop, pack and deliver bags of food every week to Aurelian Springs Elementary school. After a particularly cold week two staff members rushed out to greet and assist in the delivery of the containers of bags of food. They wanted to assure and commend our church for our commitment to improving the quality of life for and reduce hunger for over 72 children in poverty. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

Another domestic hunger initiative is our church Food Pantry. It has been witnessed by many church members that non members have been observed to put food items in the pantry. It continues to endear us to the community as we take steps to feed the hungry. The overwhelming generosity of the First Presbyterian congregation on Souper Bowl Sunday will help keep the pantry filled for at least a couple of months. We collected 190+ items of canned goods, boxed food, and items needed for personal hygiene. The witness committee would like to thank everyone who has contributed to this worthy project.

In the future, the Witness Committee hopes to partner with the community action inter-denominational group, Feeding Families First, and numerous special projects to help needy children and families in our area. Specifically, a clothing initiative has been requested by several school counselors and this group. More information to follow.

As we ponder, the sacrifices that Jesus has made for us in these 40 days of Lent, please remember that there are many people who are hungry, in need of shelter, in need of clothing, and other necessary items to have a minimal quality of life. Remember, Jesus said, "...as you do to the least of these, you do to me".

The Witness Committee has been discussing ways to witness the discernment of the Session to be a Matthew 25 Congregation. Building congregational vitality is one of the focal points of the Matthew 25 invitation according to our Presbyterian Planning Calendar. Recall that the church declared in the Confession of 1967 "...the church is gathered in corporate life and dispersed in society for the sake of Mission in the world." On March 17, Presbyterians worldwide will advocate for social justice and look at ways we can focus on... "Love kindness do justice, and walk humbly with our God." Shalom.
